Call to Order

Chairman Bromilow called the meeting to order and welcomed all members and guests. Chair Bromilow solicited public comments from the floor and requested comments to be limited to 3 minutes per speaker. No public comments.

Approval of June 11, 2019 meeting minutes/ Changes to Agenda

The June 11, 2019 agenda was reviewed. No changes were made to the Agenda. Mr. Mike Mills made a motion to approve the June 11, 2019 Agenda and Mr. Moses Corbett seconded the motion. All PTAC voted in approval. The April 9, 2019 meeting minutes were reviewed. Mr. Howie Norwick made a motion to approve the minutes and Mr. Moses Corbett seconded the motion. All PTAC members voted in approval of the meeting minutes for April 9, 2019.

Link Transit and ACTA Service Coordination

At the March meeting PTAC requested staff to develop information regarding the general purpose trips provided by ACTA and the proximity of those trips to Link Transit bus stops. PTAC would like to determine if ACTA general purpose trip coordination with Link Transit is feasible and how that could occur to benefit

operational efficiency and rider satisfaction. Mr. Rob Killebrew presented PTAC with the ridership information and maps to help assist with this discussion.

Mr. Killebrew said he felt it was important to revisit this agenda item, discuss it and make a decision on it so PTAC and staff can move forward. Mr. Killebrew explained that each yellow dot on his presentation represented a pick up and a drop off through ACTA that happened within a ¼ of a mile of Link Transit's fixed route service. Mr. Killebrew said the reason staff uses the ¼ of a mile is because that is FTA's guidelines for planning transit systems and/or planning for bus stops/routes. Mr. Killebrew shared ACTA had 3,612 general purpose trips originating and ending within ¼ mile of Link Transit's fixed route during January 1, 2017 – June 2018. Mr. Killebrew explained that ACTA's general purpose trips serve many of the same destinations as Link Transit.

Mr. Carter questioned the taxes are going towards two different transportation services with so much overlap. Mr. Bromilow questioned if ACTA felt they get their money based on ridership; are they losing money if they lose certain general purpose trips. Mr. Nunn responded that ACTA receive funds from DOT for medical trips. He also explained that Link Transit gets additional funds based on increases in ridership. Mr. Mills questioned when clients call in to reserve their ride, is this when ACTA determines if it is a medical trip or general purpose trip.

Mr. Nunn reminded PTAC that their role was to decide if this is efficient or what can staff do to make it more efficient. Mr. Mills expressed he felt it was a disservice to some if they switched from ACTA services and rode with Link Transit; likeliness of walking in areas with no sidewalks was a higher probability when using Link Transit. Mr. Norwick stated how he felt ACTA are more like a delivery service (such as Uber, Lyft, etc). He said he does not look at ACTA as a public transportation service, more so a subsidized shared ride. Mr. Norwick explained that the people who can't walk the ¼ of mile to a bus stop have the option to apply for Link's paratransit services. Mr. Nunn said to keep in mind with the general purpose trips you cannot discriminate if someone can walk a ¼ mile or not.

Mr. Nunn said the purpose of this agenda item was so that PTAC and staff could discuss options, to consider the use of the grant in advance; this may be information needed to present to council one day. Mr. Nunn felt it important to plan ahead for the use of the grant. Mr. Killebrew said these are our core riders, people that live, travel, and work in ¼ mile of our fixed route. Mr. Killebrew stated our core riders are these general purpose trips. Mr. Killebrew suggested that ACTA's purpose may be to focus on medical trips and jobs that are not in ¼ mile of our fixed route.

Mr. Killebrew questioned if PTAC wanted staff to discuss with ACTA on how they can manage funds instead of the overlapping of funds. Mr. Killebrew shared that staff would like to recommend an operating agreement with ACTA to coordinate and facilitate general purpose trips within ¼ mile of Link Transit fixed route service. Chair Bromilow suggested a motion that staff studies an operating agreement (discussion mode) with ACTA. Ms. Mcbane made a motion that staff studies an operating agreement with ACTA to coordinate and facilitate general purpose trips within ¼ mile of Link Transit fixed route service. Mr. Norwick seconded the motion and all PTAC voting in approval.

Link Transit Operations Report

Mr. Killebrew presented the Link Transit Operations report to PTAC. Mr. Killebrew shared Link Transit served 40,595 total trips between January 2019 and May 2019. Mr. Killebrew said there were 2,153 total trips on Link paratransit between January 2019 and May 2019.

Mr. Killebrew provided the TransLoc Data (Web or App hits) for 2019 from January to May:

Mr. Killebrew informed PTAC that staff had put out a RFP for a bus shelter. Mr. Killebrew shared that staff received a bid in May from Jericho Palms that was an acceptable bid for Link Transit's needs. Mr. Killebrew said that staff is planning for 5 bus shelters to be installed FY2020. Mr. Carter questioned the cost for a bus shelter. Mr. Killebrew responded it would cost around \$8,000 for a complete bus shelter not included the concrete pad or any cost for right-of-ways. Mr. Killebrew explained that a complete bus shelter included the shelter, a bench, trash can and solar light.

Mr. Killebrew shared potential areas for a bus shelter along the fixed routes:

- 1. Burlington YMCA
- 2. Alamance Crossing
- 3. Cum Park Plaza/Food Lion

★ 4. Huffine Mill Road/Forestdale Drive

- 5. N Mebane St/Walmart
- 6. Maple Ave/Floyd St

Mr. Killebrew said originally staff had looked into a bus shelter location at the Brittany Apartments but that particular area had a few deterrents such as large maintained/landscaped areas. Ms. McBane said she had understood it was staff's plan

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to have 5 bus shelters installed. Mr. Killebrew said staff plans to have 5 complete bus shelters installed and a bench concept for the others. PTAC members questioned the idea of a bench concept and what type of areas could benefit from them. Mr. Killebrew responded, saying areas like Trail Two; high volume ridership area, people sitting up against the signs but two may deterrents for a complete bus shelter. Mr. Killebrew described the bench concept to be a concrete pad, bench, small trash can and a solar light.

Other Business

Mr. Killebrew stated the NC Public Transportation Conference was held in Wilmington, NC back in April. Mr. Killebrew said two Link Transit drivers also participated in the bus driver rodeo held at this event.

Mr. Killebrew shared service began Tuesday, May 28, 2019 at the newest bus stop at Salvation Army (Stockard St and Dixie St).

Mr. Killebrew also mentioned the full page advertisement Link Transit had in the Times News for fare free week. Mr. Killebrew shared Link Transit had 4,079 passengers total during the week of fare free. Saying the week was a success; including on Thursday as staff celebrated with riders Link's 3rd Anniversary at the Temporary Transfer Hub with Link Transit giveaways and a cupcake cake. Mr. Killebrew said Link Transit set a record with 1, 235 riders in one day; having to add another bus to the routes. Mr. Killebrew also mentioned ACC participated in an event on the Link buses Tuesday June 4th during fare free week called "Get loud for literacy and learning'. Mr. Killebrew said the passengers loved this event and were happy to receive all of the books and information ACC was sharing. A group of 45 people from ACC Dillingham center also took part in the fare free week; riding the bus to the YMCA to have a scavenger hunt at City Park, said Mr. Killebrew. Mr. Killebrew said he received positive feedback from the students at the ACC Dillingham center saying how much they enjoyed riding Link Transit for FREE and how nice the drivers were that day.

Chair Bromilow questioned how Link Transit counts ridership. Mr. Killebrew said ridership is when someone steps on the bus, no matter how many times they have to use different buses to get to their destination; they are counted every time they step on the bus.

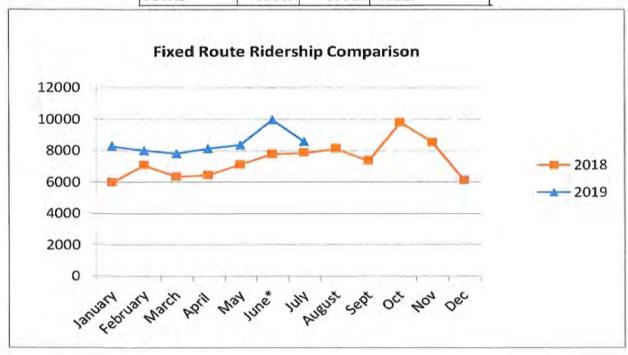

meeting and Mr. Moses Corbett seconded the motion. All PTAC members voted in approval.

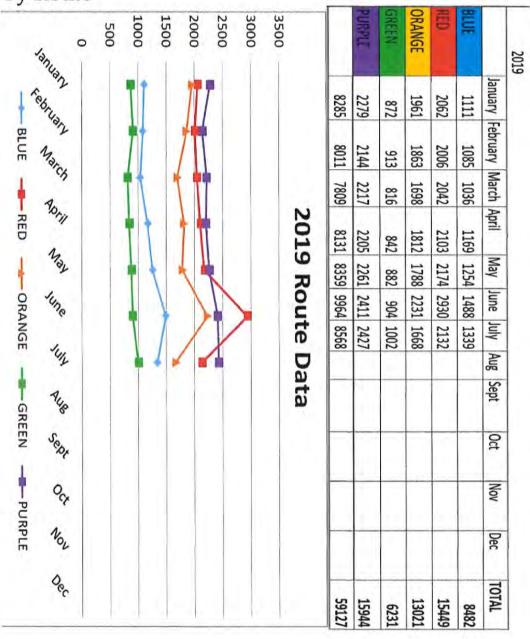
Fixed Route

%Change is 2018 to 2019

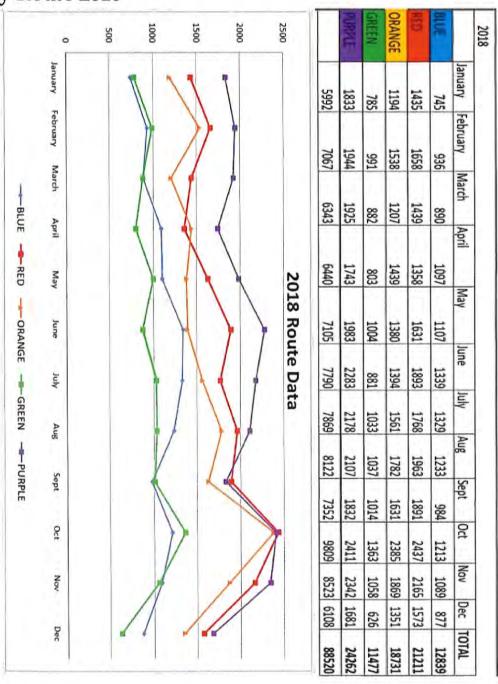

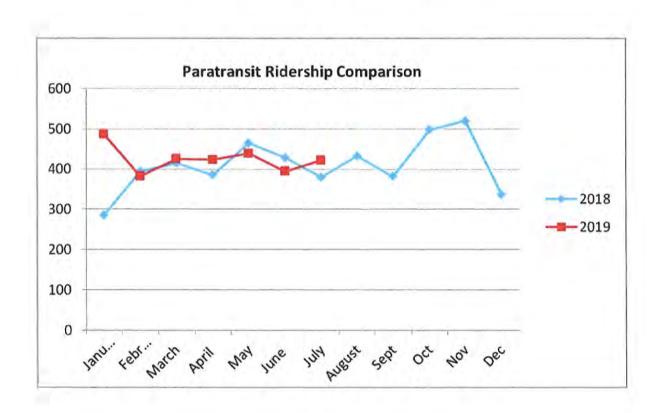
